Kona Yarwala was born into the union of Mr. & Mrs. Alfred Weah at a hospital in Kolahum, Lofa County. During her birth, she came out of the womb foaming, jerking, eye twisted and conversing. After the mid-wife treated her mother, her mother later said, I am not carrying this cripple thing anywhere(referring to the baby). Then, I the grandmother Sona Kpoto, took the baby and have been taking care of her since June 15, 2003 up to this present time.

As her grandmother, I have carried her to so many doctors, including doctors on Mercy Ship. They told me she has two brains and she will walk and talk, but it will take time.



Princess Alpha, 5yrs

As a parent, I felt discouraged when it was time for my child to sit and it came and passed. I started running around to find help.

When I hear of church and any doctor, I go there to see if I can get help, but no way for me yet. People are telling me to take her to a country doctor, but I say no, because I know God will bring someone one day to help.

Today I heard of My Heart's Appeal and I came and I hope God will help us all.



Alex Johnson, 10yrs

As a person with disability, it is difficult to live in a country that cannot provide the necessary care. This makes life unbearable and hopeless for me. Alex, born in Ganta City, Nimba County, his parents both died during the Liberian civil war. Since then, I his aunt, Marie Dahn and husband Alex Ray Johnson have been taking care within the limitation of available means of livelihood.

At age three years of age, little Alex Ray Johnson was brought to Monrovia and has been provided various kind of attention, including medical, social and rehabilitation on Mercy Ship. It is the guardian prayer that Big Ma's Care will be of help through God's grace.



Clara Doe, 3yrs

As a mother, I am very sad to see me child in this condition. I pray to God everyday to help my child.

Some experiences I had with my child since she was born was that she almost went blind from measles and also paralyze. I really struggled from these sicknesses when my child was a little smaller, but at least now she is trying to see and to walk in her weak way.



Fatu Teakpor, 13yrs

I was pregnant in 1993 and after a few months, I could not feel the movement of the child for a few days. I went to the hospital for treatment and after that everything was okay. When I gave birth the child was very weak.

When my child reached four month, she could not sit by herself. After about two years, she started gaining strength little by little until now. She can walk by herself, but cannot talk.



Edwin Kollie, 14yrs

I feel very bad to see this my grandchild with no school in the community to help him.

I will be happy to see him using his hands to learn how to read and write.



Momo Utah, 10yrs

I have carried the child to many herbalist for cure to no avail. I find it difficult to supply the needs of myself and my son. We cannot easily get medicine and sometimes no funds to prepare food.

I sometimes try to give up. It is difficult for me to travel. I can hardly get help from my family members, especially my brother.

My son gets frequent diarrhoea and dysentery. He eats frequently but no growth. He does not understand and follow instructions. He frequently sucks his fingers.



Lovetor Thompson, 8yrs

I feel it very difficult to meet the needs of my children and myself due to the illness of my daughter. This is because no one takes care of her to allow me to do anything that I could get money. For this reason we know it is not easy to live with a disability in our country Liberia.



Ruth Nimene, 26yrs

I feel bad sometimes, because I cannot get help. I want to send her to school like anybody else. I do not like for people to laugh at her. She just wants to be loved. I hope this program will be successful for her. As a grandmother, I have been working with her very hard.



Lawrence Sayeh, 17yrs

It is very important that this organization be brought in Liberia, because so many children are unable to do things on their own. They are disabled in the country so it is necessary that they help our children in Liberia.

Sometimes I go to work as a father and my son moves from place to place. My mother is very old, she do not have the strength to take care of him. He has problems. At the end people beat on him and that alone plays on his mind. So I deem it necessary for the organization to come to my aid.

My experience as an individual and a family member with disabilities is very bad. In the first place my government of Liberia has never provided the right institutions that should look out for the interest of its citizens with these disabilities.
